
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INTRODUCTION

Amongst the manuscripts preserved at the Meeting House of the Religious Society of Friends, Eustace Street, Dublin, are the six collections of Wills and Inventories from which we have prepared Abstracts.¹ These Wills are now of exceptional value because of the destruction in 1922 of practically all the original Irish Wills in the Record Office.

The Society of Friends has always laid stress on the proper keeping of Minutes, and of records of Births, Deaths and Marriages. William Edmondson³ and a few of his friends met in the first Quaker meeting in Ireland at Lurgan in 1654. Fourteen years later he was largely responsible for the organisation of the Society in Ireland, after which Minutes and Records were kept by most Meetings. Some records are retrospective to 1655. The original reason for keeping books of Wills is best explained by quoting the title page of one of them, "A Book For the Recordinge the Last Wills of Friends deceased wherein the Trust is Left (by any friend deceased) to Executo[r]s or Trustees of theyrs Personall or Reale Estates Bequeathed to children in theyer Mynority, that such Estates be Well Looked into and Preserved from Loss or Weast, that such children, orphants, be not wronged. Dated in Dublin the 26 of the 6 month 1684."³

The last wishes of a testator in settling his affairs can seldom be of historical significance, but because the names of some of the early Quaker pioneers in Ireland appear in these Wills it is well to recall that they lived in a difficult time of great political activity when the harsh laws of the English Parliament to suppress Irish trade were almost wholly successful. In Dublin the Quakers were generally merchants and manufacturers,⁴ but they were for the most part small traders and farmers in country districts.

Abstracts of the Wills and Inventories

The Abstracts are arranged in alphabetical order under testators' surnames. Minor bequests to local meetings and charities have been omitted but all items of general interest are included. As far as possible the actual wording used by a testator has been copied. It will be noticed that some documents are Deeds of Settlement or Deeds of Trust, not Wills, but they were in effect Wills. A deed was drawn up whereby the principal party or grantor assigned his real and personal estate to trustees to hold for his lifetime on his behalf, and then to dispose of according to his wishes, the trustees being put in actual possession of such effects by payment of a small sum, usually sixpence, paid over at the time of the drawing up of the deed.

To many of the Wills and Deeds Inventories were attached, made by appraisers after the death of the testator or grantor.¹ Judging by the inclusion of such small assets as stocks of bees great care must have been taken in drawing up these Inventories.² Some of these Inventories are lists giving the value of each article, others merely group articles together and give a total figure. We have noted the general types of assets contained in each Inventory, preceded by the words "valuations of" if the Inventory is in detail. Contemporary values of the late seventeenth century being of special interest we have quoted some items from Inventories for the period 1675-1715. These show that the maximum value of a cow was f_{2} 10s. 0d., winter corn was f_{2} an acre, oats 4/- per barrel, wool 11/- per stone, tobacco 6d. to 11d. per pound, silver about 5/6 per ounce, while groceries ranged from 5d. to 9d. per pound for sugar to 9/- per pound for cloves and nutmegs. An idea of life some two hundred and fifty years ago can be learnt not only from the Wills themselves but from the lists of furniture and household articles, the variety of merchandise in the shops,³ the goods sent abroad in efforts to increase trading, the tools and implements in everyday use.

We are grateful to the owners of the manuscripts, the Dublin Monthly Meeting of the Society of Friends, and the Wexford Monthly Meeting, for permission to make these abstracts, and we must thank the Registrar for the excellent facilities afforded to us.

Executors my kinsman Thomas Williams of Newmarket and Peter Wainwright of Skinner's Alley, carpenters. To be buried in the burying place of my friends called Quakers near Stephens Green. My late husband William Allen. All residue of my estate, goods etc. equally to my cousin Hannah Williams, wife of said Thomas Williams and my cousin Jane Wilkinson, daughter of Alexander Wilkinson, clothier.

To be held in trust to pay debts, remainder to my niece Susanna Harding, wife of Henry Harding of Mountmellick in Queen's Co., for her sole use without interference from her husband, and after her death for her children male or female and to their respective heirs. Also to my said niece Susanna Harding interest in my holding in Kevin Street on the South side, let by trustees of Edward Sampson, deceased, to my father Thomas Ashton, deceased. In event of death of said niece and her children the holding on Swan Alley to go to the two sons of Hannah Harris, alias Smith, late of city of Waterford, deceased, who I think are named Joseph Harris and William Harris and to their heirs (subject to £100 each to their three sisters, daughters of the said Hannah Harris) or in default of heirs to Joseph Willcocks aforesaid and his heirs, or defaulting to • the select members of the Mens Meeting of the people called Quakers in Trust for poor Friends.

To my daughter Mary Baker 3 small houses at Stoney Batter and £800, said sums to be paid my said daughters when of age or on marriage. To the two daughters of my brother Peter Baker, namely Sarah and Elizabeth £10 apiece. To cousin John Baker my late apprentice £10 and to his sister Katherine £5. William Eves and John Penrose, both of Wicklow, farmers, to distribute £50 to poor Quakers in Co. Wicklow. 12 BALSTER, JAMES, Dublin, yeoman.

To my brother-in-law Thomas Atherton, cordwinder, and my cousin Amos Strettell, Dublin, linendraper, all goods and chattells, annuities and leases on trust. To hold to said trustees for use of me, said James Balster, for life, and after my decease for use of my wife Margaret Balster alias Holmes, she to pay my brothers Hugh Balster and John Balster and my sister Elizabeth Russell five shillings each if demanded; to my cousin James Russell (in case the trustees enjoy the land called Castletown fourteen years after my decease) $f_{.5}$.

To my wife Ann Barclay silver to value £25, excluding punch bowl and rim belonging to it and large silver cup. "To my son John Barclay the large Bible given me by my brother David Barclay." My grandson Barclay Clibborn, son of my daughter Experience Clibborn. My wife's niece Joanna Rooke. Son-inlaw James Clibborn. My five daughters Ann, Patience, Elizabeth, Jane and Lydia Barclay, (Lydia not yet of age). My friend Ambrose Barcroft, of Dublin, timber merchant. "The trade or business which I now follow, to be carried on by my wife and son John by the name of Ann Barclay and Son in trust for themselves and the rest of my children," viz. 5 daughters named, they being at liberty to withdraw from business if so desired. House, warehouses and estate in Eustace Street to be disposed of at discretion of executors. Executors wife Ann Barclay, son John Barclay and son-in-law James Clibborn of the Moate.

To my daughter Deborah Fuller £10 towards bringing up Mary Fuller, daughter of Jacob Fuller, and all residue. £10 to poor friends of Edenderry and Carlow meetings. £5 each to my cousin John Baker of Dublin, Katherine Crawford of Dublin, Daniel Bernard and Dorothy Mason, both of Ballytore. My sons-in-law Henry Fuller of Ballytore, Co. Kildare and John Pim of Edenderry, King's Co., executors, they to dispose of my cattle and other substance, two thirds to my daughter Deborah Fuller in trust for her children, the males to be paid at age of 21 and the females on day of marriage; remaining one third to "my son" John Pim in trust, £100 for my two granddaughters, Mary and Elizabeth Pim and the remainder for the other six children of my daughter Mary Pim, deceased, viz. John, Sarah, Hannah, Samuel, Deborah and Susanna Pim when of age or on marriage. And whereas some of my said grandchildren are already married such grandchildren shall have their part paid as soon as conveniently can be.

"Goods sent to New Jersie in America $\pounds 15$ 14. 0." "Goods in Benjamin Furlow's hands in Roterdam $\pounds 22$. 0. 0." "Eight boxes of sop and candles ventured to Jamaica $\pounds 15$. 0. 0." "356 yards of frize sent to London per Wm. Blundall $\pounds 22$. 6. 0."
